

THE OPERATIONS ON THE DANUBE.

DISAFFECTION OF CIRCASSIAN CAVALRY—

THEY REFUSE TO FIRE ON THEIR CO-RELIGIONISTS—THE CZAR'S VISIT TO THE ARMY.

LONDON, May 31.—The *Standard* has the following from Vienna, May 30: "Thirteen trains filled with Circassian cavalry in the Russian service had passed over the Moldavian railways in one day on their way back to Russia. Three squadrons will be disarmed. The Shiek-ul-Islam found means to let these troops know that a holy war had been declared. They have since shown great discontent, and many declared they would not fire on their co-religionists. A regiment will be sent to the Siberian garrisons."

The suite accompanying the Czar to Roumania numbers 300.

In consequence of numerous accidents the Roumanian railroads will shortly be placed entirely under Russian management.

The heavy rains still delay operations.

The *Times'* Bucharest dispatch says: "The weather is now dry and hot. No very serious resistance to the actual crossing of the Danube is apprehended, as the fortresses will be avoided, and the want of proper organization renders the Turkish Armies unwieldy in large masses. The Turks to-day made their fifth attempt to establish a battery opposite Islacz, but were driven away by Roumanian guns."

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
